Spotlight: Dr. Kenneth Horn, in his own words

I was born in the house where my parents, Ike and Flora Horn, lived on the Saltillo Gulf Pump Station property. When I was 9 ½ years old, we moved into town. I graduated from Saltillo High School in 1948. We moved to Paris in June 1949 when I was a sophomore at East Texas State Teacher's College (now Texas A&M University – Commerce). I received bachelors and masters degrees (with a major in business administration in each degree) from East Texas. After graduation, I spent four years in the United States Air Force.

After teaching one year at Mars Hill College in North Carolina, I returned to East Texas State to teach. I received my doctorate at The University of Oklahoma (with emphasis in business education). Joyce Smith of Waverly, Missouri, and I were married on May 29, 1962. She passed away on November 24, 2002. I have a son Kevin (deceased); two daughters, Yvonne and Colleen; six grandchildren; and two great-grandchildren.



We moved to Bolivar, Missouri, in August 1965, where I was a department head and professor at Southwest Baptist College (now University).

We moved to Springfield in November 1972, where I retired from teaching at Missouri State University. I taught a total of 39 years. I am a Christ follower and strive, with His help, to embrace His leadership daily in all areas of my life.

Old Saltillo Roots

When I was growing up the Old Saltillo Cemetery was a very important part of my family's life because that's where most of our family is buried. My granddad Henry Dow Arthur and my mother Christine Arthur both grew up in Saltillo and I was born there in 1941 so I always felt that's where my roots are. When I was a kid we went to the cemetery guite often and Mama would tell us who each grave belonged to and how we were related

and at a young age I couldn't imagine having that many relatives that I didn't know.

When I was older and moved away from Texas I felt there was something missing and felt the need to stay in touch with my roots and my family that still lives there. I always thought it was very exciting to know my family heritage and that my pioneer ancestors played a part in the Saltillo community history from the beginning.

They built their homes and businesses and some just wanted to farm their land but most of them would never see the family they left behind again. They suffered hardship's that we can't even imagine in our lifetime and they were our brave ancestors that rose far and above life challenges to succeed in building a better future for all of us. Now who among us are not proud of these wonderful people buried in this beautiful cemetery!!!

www.ancestry.com, or www.findagrave.com and I can also do a lot of research there.

www.findagrave.com is a free site and also has a discussion forum so you can ask for help, and everyone there is very helpful.

www.familysearch.org/search is also a great source and it's also free. I use www.google.com sometimes and just do a search for whatever information I am needing. While searching through all the cemeteries on www.findagrave.com, I've noticed that the Old Saltillo Cemetery has more photos and biographies than nearly all other cemeteries. I think that's a sign that we are proud of our ancestors that settled

there. It's wonderful to see all those photos, giving faces to the names of ancestors we've long seen carved on stone in the Old Saltillo Cemeterv.
