Speaker Spotlight: Carlyn Hammons

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Our Association recognizes that cemetery monuments are the personal property of the families of those interred. At the same time, many people remembered at the Old Saltillo Cemetery no longer have relatives nearby to care for their markers. In those situations, we feel a responsibility to step in for the sake of historical preservation. The goal is always preservation, not replacement. When stones have shifted or sunken, careful repositioning and stabilization techniques are used to help protect the marker while respecting its original placement. Broken stones are repaired whenever possible, using methods intended to preserve the historic material rather than erase it. While our Association does not take on monument cleaning itself, we encourage families to use safe, non-invasive cleaning practices when caring for loved ones' stones. Gentle tools and appropriate solutions can remove dirt or biological growth without damaging the surface. Just as important, we work to share information about proper cemetery care so that well-meaning efforts do not accidentally cause harm.

One of our Association's most meaningful preservation tools is the use of supplemental preservation markers. These markers are created to reflect, word for word, the original inscriptions on historic monuments that may be deteriorating. They do not replace the original stones. Instead, they stand as respectful companions, helping make names, dates, and legacies readable for visitors while the original monuments remain protected in place.

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
